Ann Watson and Lorraine Powell were thanked for their time on the Committee. The Guides are now led by Beth and Raoul Dixon with Raoul the representative on the Committee. Kathleen Hobson is the representative of the History Group and we welcome Kaye Crawford as a Committee member. Other positions are unchanged.

Life membership was awarded to Judith Bailey. Judith has taken part in every aspect of the Friends activities and has been a member since incorporation. She certainly is a worthy recipient.

The Begonia Festival weekend was indeed memorable. The heavens opened and we had the most marvellous three days of rain to gladden the hearts of all gardeners. No doubt, however, the conditions affected the attendance but many braved the elements and the feedback was very positive regarding the format of the Festival. The Gardens and the Begonias were just outstanding and the highlight was having 8 of the Stoddart Statues back on their pedestals in the Gardens. What a joy to see them back where they belong and as I write the other four are also being returned. The staff is to be congratulated for creating such excellence for the Festival.



On the 9<sup>th</sup> March (still raining and blowing a gale) the Friends met at the Old Cemetery for a ceremony to celebrate the unveiling of the refurbished grave of benefactor, Thomas Stoddart. His gift to the City was the 12 Carrara marble statues in 1888 and over the years his grave had fallen into disrepair. Joining us were the Mayor, Cr Judy Verlin, Cr Samantha McIntosh, members of The Ballarat Foundation which funded the project and representatives of organisations which had lent support. The project was the brainchild of Jenny Burrell with the help of the History Group and made possible by The Ballarat Foundation's grant. With the background sound of the bagpipes, with wind and rain outside, Jenny delivered a memorable comprehensive address concerning the background to the gift in the context of Ballarat in the 1880s. This was indeed a most important event not only for the Friends but also for the City of Ballarat.

Thank you to Carole Haines and crew for the ready cuppa at the end of the morning.

A large proportion of the assembled returned to join us including several ex-mayors, councillors, members of The Ballarat Foundation and of course us.


### **Lorraine Powell Convenor**



*The unveiling of the refurbished grave of Thomas Stoddart* took place on Tuesday the 9th of March at 10.00am at the Ballarat Old Cemetery. About 40 invited guests, including Mayor Judy Verlin, gathered in the rotunda to shelter from the cold and the rain to the strains of the bagpipes. President Joan Garner welcomed the guests

and introduced Jenny Burrell who gave an address on the life of Thomas Stoddart and the significance of his gift of the statue collection to the Ballarat Botanical Gardens in 1884. That first generous act began the movement to make Ballarat a "City of Statues" whose only rival was Edinburgh in Stoddart's home country of Scotland. Only two years later, in 1886, Thomas Stoddart was one of three trustees appointed to administer the bequest of James Russell Thomson which resulted in the addition of six more magnificent marble statues and the Statuary House which has become the icon of the Gardens adopted for the Friends logo.

During a break in the weather John Garner and Jenny Burrell lifted the covering of the flag of St Andrews off the grave to reveal the restored railing (which had been missing), the gilt lettering and the new plaque. Lorraine Powell, Convenor of the Friends History Group, and Kathleen Hobson, Vice-President of the Friends and a member of the History Group, then placed a wreath of flowers they had made from the Gardens. It was pleasing to see so many representatives of the organisations who supported our submission to The Ballarat Foundation for funding of the project. Afterwards refreshments were enjoyed in the George Longley Building. It was remarkable timing, to hold this ceremony of respect to a fine gentleman just seven days after the first eight Stoddart statues were returned to their pedestals out in the Gardens after being indoors for the past eight years.

### **JOHN'S JOTTINGS**

**The Druids' Oaks** – We have two "Druids' Oaks" in the Gardens, both English Oaks (*Quercus robur*). They were planted 100 years apart, the first in 1870 with the founding of local Druid Lodges and the second in 1970 planted by Bro. Croft as a centenary commemoration. The relevance of Oak trees relates to the ancient traditions of the original Druids who met in groves of Oak trees, also to the root of thereof - (Greek – drus). It is believed that the 1870 tree came from Melbourne, the acorn from England. The Druid Friendly Society was founded in England in 1781. The first Australian lodge was set up by Bro. Hymen and the first Melbourne Lodge by Bro. Barnard in 1861. Rapid expansion of the Order followed, particularly in rural and gold mining areas. The objectives of the Society were to provide sickness and funeral benefits, benevolence and charity work particularly aimed at assisting those who had fallen on hard times. In Ballarat there were two Lodges, the Ancient Britain and the Royal Oak, both of which have now ceased activities, support from younger people not forthcoming over the past 20 years. The associated Friendly Society was absorbed into another Health Fund.

## GARDENS REPORT


Currently gardens staff are removing the summer display in preparation for the planting of the spring display. The begonia display closes on the 26<sup>th</sup> of April with the conservatory reopening later that week after installation of the chrysanthemum display. Coming up in the Conservatory will be the Craft Council of Ballarat's exhibition and sale which runs from the 7<sup>th</sup> to the 14<sup>th</sup> of June.

It was good to see people taking advantage of the pleasant weather over the Easter weekend, a number of events were held in the precinct including two car rallies and a family reunion. It was also good to see 35mm of rain fall on Easter Tuesday night, hopefully the autumn rains will continue.

Friday the 9<sup>th</sup> of April will see the return of the final four Stoddart Statues to their original positions in the gardens. The pedestals for Flora Farnese, Leda, Mercury and Hercules were removed for storage a number of years ago and have recently been reinstalled. Last month saw the return of eight of the Stoddart statues in time for the Begonia weekend. Feedback from garden visitors regarding the statues return has been very positive.

Congratulations to the friends on the recent completion of restoration works on the grave of Thomas Stoddart. The ceremony at the old Cemetery on the 9<sup>th</sup> of March proved to be a memorable occasion with the addition of bagpipes and suitable highland weather.
