FRIENDS OF BALLARAT BOTANICAL GARDENS PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In an effort to provide an opportunity to engage with the City of Ballarat, all Councillors were invited to attend an informal discussion with the Committee on February 14. Unfortunately only Deputy Mayor Jim Rinaldi, Cr Grant Tillett and Terry Demeo were available. However several matters were discussed. Given the difficulty of getting all Councillors together at the one time, the Committee will consider trying a different format for future meetings.

This year's **Annual General Meeting** held on February 21 saw a few changes to the Committee membership:

- John King has stepped down as Vice President but still remains on the Committee as a General Member, and Terry O'Brien has agreed to take up the Vice President position. I thank Terry very much for being prepared to take on this most important succession planning role.
- Susan Rattray resigned as Secretary but continues on with the Growing Friends. Her dedication in carrying out a rather challenging role over the last three years is very much appreciated, thank you Susan for a job well done.

Our guest speaker, **Ian Shears** who is *Practice Lead*, *Urban Forestry and Green Infrastructure*, City of Melnbourne, gave a most enlightening address covering many aspects of the focus on making our cities more liveable. Again, **Elizabeth Gilfillan** was able to draw on one of her many contacts, and we thank her for arranging a most interesting speaker.

The Begonia Festival over the week-end of March 9 and 10 followed on from the busy month of February. Although the weather was somewhat variable, overall the Festival was most successful. Congratulations to Peter Marquand and the gardening team for maintaining the gardens in top condition for the many thousands of visitors. The begonias consistently attract a huge amount of attention with long queues all weekend.

Takings from nursery sales and the plant creche amounted to \$7,781, which sets a new record. We are very fortunate to have such a dedicated hard working group of Growers who achieved this excellent result. Congratulations to **Yvonne Curbach** and her team, who work tirelessly throughout the year.

The **BotaniKids** were again a big drawcard under the guidance of **Julie Bradby** and **Lorraine Powell**. Congratulations to both of them and the other volunteers who made this attraction a centre of continuous activity. The large amount of preparation work prior to the Festival certainly paid off.

Many thanks also to all the other volunteers who so willingly gave their time over the week-end to help make the Festival an enjoyable event.





As a result of this exchange, the Guides are hoping to host Barry for a special afternoon gathering where he will talk about his contact with 20 PMs! Further information will be available soon but it will be on in June (Saturday afternoon).

The Guides latest project concerns gathering all the known material on the **Sequoias**. This is a work in progress and with many possibilities as to an end result. Comprehensive summary notes for both the Guides and Ambassadors is the first goal. Depending on our success and enthusiasm we may develop it into a brochure and/or a printed handout. We have also discussed having a special public event with speakers and film where we bring it all together for our interested community.

After the great success of the **evening tours** in January and February (the PMs and the Statues), there is also interest in having more specially themed tours. Two that have been suggested are the rejuvenated Western Bed and the many Special Trees in the Gardens.

We are hoping to conduct a further U3A course about the Botanical Gardens in 2020. These have been hugely successful in recent years with a break being taken in 2019.

Gardens tours have continued for various visiting groups under the capable guidance of Jane Monro, who must sometimes wonder why do some bookings require so much additional organisation once they have been set!



The Guides are hoping to acquire a new sound system and some type of lightweight marker or flag to enhance their presentations.

Finally, during the recent Melbourne International Flower Show, many of our Guides participated by helping to run the information stall for our peak organisation (the Australian Association of Friends of Botanic Gardens). AAFBG membership currently consists of 59 Friends of Botanic Gardens groups from capital city, suburban and rural and regional botanic gardens and arboreta across the country.

AGM 2019

Our AGM was well attended and President Robert Selkirk had plenty to report, with developments in the *Fernery* restoration, *Gatekeepers Cottage* and the *Ballarat Botanical Gardens Foundation*. Volunteers were congratulated on the success of the initial *FBBG/Rotary* collaboration on the *Garden DesignFest*, with its resulting donation of \$5000 to the *Gatekeepers Cottage*.

Ian Shears (*Practice Leader, Urban Forest and Green Infrastructure, City of Melbourne*) gave a fascinating and inspirational presentation about how Local Government can respond to Climate Change and population growth and provide green spaces into the future.

His illustrated talk showed how Melbourne has changed since settlement and the need to nourish natural systems, not degrade them. He discussed the importance of tree canopy in keeping cities cool and the predictions of its loss over coming decades.

Ian has championed new approaches to urban water storage, the potential for roof top, vertical and laneway gardens as well as the importance of insect life in urban areas. He outlined innovative projects such as the Birrarung Marr Flower Meadow, the Errol Street Park (where streets were reclaimed in North Melbourne) and Urban Agriculture successes.

He spoke of *re-naturing* urban areas and showed some fascinating aerial images of change. His aim is "to have a city in a forest, rather than a forest in a city".



Friends Committee Profile: John King talks to Susan Pilbeam

When we moved to Ballarat, being asked to join *FBBG* in 2013 was a great introduction. The opportunity to be part of a progressive, supportive group concerned about gardens was overwhelmingly positive. Little did I know what talented members I would discover!

Members' knowledge and devotion to caring and promoting the BBG is amazing. With nearly 400



members the *FBBG* has something for all to be part of and contribute to the exciting projects. The *Fernery Project*, which is now coming to eventual completion, demonstrates the perseverance of dedicated members.

Also the highly recognised work of the *BotaniKids* program, in promoting hands on introduction to children of the importance of gardens and the environment.

My love of gardens and

the environment began as a boy, growing up in Northern Victoria, earning pocket money by doing gardening jobs for other farmers. All my family were keen gardeners, along with family friends. We even had a school garden and in those days we went on nature walks, as part of a subject called Nature Studies.

After training as a teacher in Melbourne, my early married life (married to Denise) in the 60's saw us take off to see the world.

Teaching in Scotland for two years we explored a different environment. I remember the rhododendrons lining the long driveway to a school I was teaching at, covered in snow and the beautiful wild primulas growing along the edges of burns. A visit to *Inverewe Garden* in

Western Ross, at the same latitude as Moscow, yet growing eucalypts thanks to the proximity of the warm waters of the Gulf Stream, is another fond memory.

Back teaching in Melbourne, with two young daughters, saw us build our first home in the beautiful Dandenongs and the chance to develop a garden from scratch. The steep sloping land and huge rocks were indeed a challenge – a native garden was the way to go.

In 1984 we moved to Canada for twelve months, temperatures down to minus 20°C and so warm in the summer that the corn crops were "as high as an elephant's eye" but the produce was exceptional.

Later we moved to Olinda to an established, but over-run garden with resident lyrebirds, abundant birdlife and tree ferns galore. I learnt that introduced sycamore trees were beautiful but had become a great pest to the natural vegetation. The blackwood tree in our garden was one to put on a heritage list.

The country was calling and with a love of old houses we moved to Camperdown in western Victoria to set up a bed and breakfast and of course establish a garden. We wanted to expand into a centre for garden weddings and established a flower garden with 500 roses, a vegetable garden, orchard and a berry patch, with enough berries for the guests' breakfasts. After 13 years we then moved to Ballarat, then to Buninyong on 6.6 hectares and of course the opportunity to establish another garden.

Three years later and after health issues, we are now living back in Ballarat and putting our own mark on yet another garden.

Gardens and gardening are indeed a journey. In my next life I am coming back as a landscape architect, as there is so much to do to enhance our environment and to address the issues facing us all!

The new face popping up at meetings and at the George Longley Building belongs to our new Promotion and Public Relations Coordinator, **Sheree Murray**.


This new role has been created to promote the work of the Friends within the community, with Ballarat's visitors and to build a strong partnership with the City of Ballarat staff and Council.


City of Ballaarat Town Hall July 9th 1890

Botanic Garden

Mr Perry

Dear Sir

It is with sorry I have to state that this morning I sent a young man out upon the Lake with the intention of having the White Swans brought in to the Fish Ponds, but the third bird was found upon an island dead in the state which you will see - in my opinion has been torn with a dog, or something of the kind. So I will put the other two in to the enclosed Fish Pond.

Reading the correspondence held in the **Public Record Office** is a wonderful way to set our Gardens in the context of their times, and discover what exercised the Council of the day with regard to their management.

In the 1880s a vexing problem was the unleashed hound!

Replying to a question from the Town Clerk of Castlemaine, George Perry (one of our long serving Town Clerks) responded that the Municipality had enacted a bylaw for the destruction of unsupervised dogs – AND '..has provided the Gardens staff with the means to do so..!

He also requested that 'Notices be placed prominently on the ferries', so probably people were travelling to the Gardens with their wandering hounds and needed reminding about standards of decorum.

Today's dog owning public is given the opportunity to exercise their pampered pooches in 'Off-Lead Parks' and presumably they are much better behaved!

Another Begonia Festival ticked off! Over sixty thousand people attended the festival over the three days. This year around twenty-six thousand people viewed the begonia display which this year also included a display of our non-tuberous begonia collection.

TIM'S BLOG: Talking Plants, Boston Ivy

March 26, 2019

Popping and buzzing reveals tiny flowers in Asian grape an ivy. It's a grape (well, from the grape family, Vitaceae), from cliffs and rocky hillsides in Korea, Japan and China. So common names like Japanese Creeper or Japanese Ivy are more apt perhaps.

Still, it's widely grown in the US, and I've extracted some of the information below from Illiinois Wildflowers site where it is is widely grown. Illinois is a few states west of Boston, Massachusetts The genus name is Ancient Greek for 'virgin ivy', which is not to be confused with the common name Virginia Creeper, applied to another species of genus, Parthenocissus guinquifolia, with its 5-lobed leaves.

CARE FOR THE RARE

Care for the Rare is a project run by the Botanic Gardens of Australia and New Zealand's Victorian Branch.

In March the Ballarat Gardens hosted the BGANZ-Vic Executive Committee. Ballarat is one of six regional botanic gardens joining the pilot scheme. The project looks at the role of the gardens in native plant conservation.

Members of the Victorian committee of BGANZ's held an executive meeting here and visited the selected site. They also determined which species would best suit. A part of that event was the assessment of multiple sites for suitability of rare indigenous plant collections.

We are now working with BGANZ to create a collections plan for rare indigenous plants.



With 11 regular members the *Botanic Art Group* is embarking on a new project,. We are painting rare and endangered plants from the Ballarat area.








In co-operation with the *Ballarat Field Naturalists* and staff at the *Ballarat Botanical Gardens*, a list of 121 plants is being researched.

NORTH GARDENS INDIGENOUS SCULPTURE PARK

The sculpture *Murrup Laarr* (Ancestral Stones) was unveiled on March 23 near the North Gardens wetlands. It is hoped to be the first of several sculptures as part of the **Resting Place Project**.



Murrup Larr is is the artwork of Wathawarung artist, Deanne Gilson. She developed the public artwork as part of her PhD. The standing stones create a space 14 metres in diameter and reference a Kulin nation lakeside corroboree in the 1850s, which was attended by miners and the local community.

The work also features a traditional hut (top right), decorated with the ochre handprints of the Gilson family, as well as several plaques.

Deanne said "Watharung people have always used stones to mark places of ceremony and important business. The stones

are the holders of memory and knowledge, country and spirit. They follow the sun, marking the summer and winter solstice, important dates for planting and harvesting and telling stories of past, present and future."



This is a significant addition to the Botanical Gardens and tells the story of the traditional land owners.

Deanne hopes people will enjoy the site as a peaceful place of reflection. The opening included a *Welcome to*



Country and Smoking Ceremony, followed by a corroboree (above).

School and Kindergarten visits continue, with the Botanikids Team providing resources and assistance. We are now a part of the newly formed alliance, with education officers at Art Gallery and Sovereign Hill, aimed at giving a wider focus to school visits in Ballarat.

Other programs will be family activities including drawing, colouring, discovering and reading and providing and maintaining kits in Conservatory and Cottage. These will be self regulated and supported by Federation University/ACU Education students, as part of their Community Projects program. A class set of stools for 'lessons' in the gardens and storage units on wheels are to be purchased.

We are certainly on the map in Ballarat and surrounds in educating children in the importance of our Gardens, plants, planting, the environment, outdoor play and learning. This year will be our biggest yet, with our dreams and visions for the future of education in the Gardens at last having a home.

How exciting to work with the Gatekeepers Cottage project group over the last year or so. Overseeing the project, Lorraine Powell, Robert Selkirk, Peter Marquand, Wendy Jacobs and myself, led by the skills of

Michael O'Connell (City of Ballarat project officer). Builder Peter Broadbent is responsible for the operations on the site and now well into its real renovating, restoration and re-imagining phase!

The large deck with planter boxes, seating and a large table in the centre, will soon become a hive of Botanikids' activity. Exterior restoration of the verandahs, fretwork and painting is in accordance with heritage recommendations and guidelines. I am proposing timber shutters.
