Wellingtonia Avenue

The giant redwoods (*Sequoiadendron giganteum*) are one of the most dominant features in the gardens. The avenue extends for more than a kilometre and forms the north-south spine of the landscape. They define the magnificent treeline when viewed from the east across Lake Wendouree and in the shade of the cathedral-like canopy many a wedding has taken place. In recent years the conservation of these signature trees has been a priority. The grandest of them all date from the 1860s and are Heritage listed. When first planted these very special trees were

known as Wellingtonias and it is proposed that we adopt this name for our newly-designed newsletter. Jenny Burrell

The Gardens Pavilion

When the Gardens Pavilion was built in 1891 it was very much part of the Botanical Gardens, not, as now, part of the Lake foreshore.

The leasing conditions at that time included provisions that the Assembly rooms be open to the public from 9 am to evening, there was to be no selling of malt or spirituous liquor or wine and the parking of carts and the hitching of horses was limited to 15 minutes.

There was a degree of protection for the Lessees, however, in that no hawking of refreshments was allowed in the Gardens or around the Gardens and Reserve by carts or hand barrows.

The list of refreshments provided in the Pavilion and the cost thereof was also laid down:-

Cup of tea with coffee or milk 3d

Lemonade, soda water, ginger ale or any other aerated water 6d

Cup of tea with bun or sandwich 6d

Dinner (two courses) Cold meat, hot vegetables and pastry with a cup of tea or coffee, salt, pepper and mustard 1/6

Tea – cup of tea with shrimps, salad or cold meat, bread and butter, salt, pepper and mustard included 1/6

Fortunately the Pavilion, now “Pipers”, is able to offer a far more extensive menu including spirituous liquor and wines. (If only that the prices could have remained unaltered!

Unusually for us, (as we are usually cloistered in the 'office'), we have been out and about, collecting data

for the planned brochure on the significant and heritage listed trees in these gardens. This project has had us being quite creative in our presentation. As they say, 'Watch this space!'

We also continue the accessioning of our library, and are more than half way finished at this point.

All members continue research into their selected topics, and this will be transformed into information sheets on the personalities, structures, statues, and plaques etc which are the rich tapestry of our gardens. For want of a better name this is being called the Gardens Manual Project. This research makes for interesting and lively discussion at our monthly meetings. Should you want to learn more or even 'tell us a thing or two' do join us at our monthly meetings, 1st Tuesday of the month 4:30-6pm.

If you read your recent 'My Ballarat' you would have noted the launch of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between members of the Ballarat Collections Network. We are a member of this group. As part of the launch, we were very proud to be able to display our Treasure, (the signed and personal copy of *Shrubs and Trees for Australian Gardens* by Ernest Lord) at the temporary exhibition of Ballarat Treasures in the Ballarat Art Gallery.

The MOU is an agreement between the parties to help each other in the event of a disaster such as the Great Flood of 2007. It also allows a greater degree of networking between the groups. This has already led to some collaborative efforts, including our assemblage of a PowerPoint presentation for David Lewis to use at the BGANZ conference at the end of the month. The history group was able to make permitted use of an image from the Art Gallery, and of information held at the Gold Museum.

Gardens Report - Peter Marquand

The legacy of previous gardening staff is evident in our impressive tree collection with over 50 trees listed on the national trust register of significant trees. In conjunction with the friends of the gardens we have purchased tree labels for Ballarat, Buninyong and Eureka gardens that specifically identify those trees. The history group is developing a brochure giving details of the heritage listed trees whilst the guiding group are developing gardens tours. We need to also be conscious that a number of those trees are under threat particularly the Sequoiadendron Avenue where more trees are to be removed in the near future.

Recently staff have been planting trees in the North and South gardens redesigning parts of the Asian section of the Western bed and mulching throughout the gardens. The fernery has also received a major cleanup with the ferns being cut back, ivy removed and the mulching of all beds. Jude Schahinger has commenced cleaning and other maintenance on the Claxton memorial. Over the next few weeks we will witness the tulips burst into flower.

We are still currently using water from the goldfields pipeline allocation prior to the gardens going onto treated waste water.

In readiness for the use of treated waste water monitoring equipment will be installed in the gardens, this equipment will enable the measuring of moisture levels at a number of sites in the gardens and on the Lake foreshore.

This week we say farewell to Sharon Williams who is finishing up on the 11th of September. Sharon has been a valued member of staff and will be missed by staff, garden visitors and tenant group members.
