Being a Guide is a great way to learn more about our wonderful Gardens.



### John's Jottings

### WEIGHTY MATTERS

The concern about obesity in the community reminded me that the Gardens used to have a weighing machine stationed outside the Statuary pavilion, and Joan tells me there was one outside the Almeida Rotunda. One machine not only informed you of your weight but also told your fortune. All for a penny! Letters from the Australian Automatic Weighing Machine Co. Ltd. to the Clerk of the Ballarat Council dated 1901 and 1902 enclosing a cheque for 4 pounds 10 shillings, rent for 3 machines at 30/- each per annum, so there must have been another one somewhere in the City. The original firm no longer exists.

The Gardens machine was removed after the introduction of the metric system in 1966 when it was pointed out to the Council that the machine did not conform because it showed the weight in pounds and ounces.

In 1979 Mr G.R,Coulson, the then Inspector of Weights and Measures, contacted the Weights and Measures Office at the Observatory Building in Melbourne, seeking information concerning current owner of the machine to be told that the Australian Eastern Engineering Co. no longer existed, being superseded by the Eastern Scale Co. In a letter to that company he explains that, "My reason for this request is that the particular weighing machine is considered as historic interest and would you be interested in negotiating to enable the Council to assume ownership. Council would need to obtain Ministerial approval to retain the existing chart."

There the trail ends at the moment. Possibly further information will come to light as the History Group continues to examine documents at the Public Records Office of Victoria In the meantime if any members have information concerning the fate of our machine or reminiscences I'd be very interested to hear. During a visit to the Melbourne Zoo two years ago I noted a number of these old machines dotted around, maybe ours is amongst them.
