HISTORY GROUP REPORT

Season's greetings to all our readers!

As we wind up the year, it is grand knowing some things have been done, and done well.

The George Longley Day was truly memorable. Many thanks go to those whose unstinting efforts made it so (Catering especially).

We had the rare privilege of being able to show the original Botanical Gardens report book George Longley wrote for the City in 1864. Heart in mouth it was displayed by Zelda Martin and returned to the Gold Museum still in one piece. (The Gold Museum being the permanent home for this part of Ballarat's history.)



We were also thrilled to have as our guest Carolyn Jones the great-granddaughter of 'Our George', and w e w e r e overwhelmed by her generous donation.



On 25 November 2010 the newly refurbished Thomson grave (which the City of Ballarat undertook in recognition of its 19th century promise) was celebrated with due ceremony. Mayor Judy Verlin acknowledged the Friends as 'tenacious and persistent advocates' for these Gardens. Jennifer Burrell made a fine speech and a piper piped in yet another 'Scottish mist'.

JOHN'S JOTTINGS

THREE STATUES

If you enter the Gardens through the Morey Gates and take the path to the left past Wallace, you will pass the three statues of Hercules, Mercury and Leda. They have an important role in the myths and legends of the Greeks and Romans, particularly regarding their birth and neo-natal development.

Zeus, the head of the Gods, was the perpetrator of many acts of infidelity which caused his wife, Hera, to get very angry. O n e n i g h t h e impersonated Amphitryon to seduce his wife Alcmene whom he fancied. She



must have been pretty surprised when her true love returned from the wars that same night having disposed of a band of pirates who had killed her brother. As the result of all this activity, she became pregnant with twins with different fathers, a case of heteropaternal hyperfecundity which occurs on occasions in animals, but is pretty rare in humans. Hercules was the offspring of Zeus, Iphicle the offspring of Amphitryon. Hercules was a strong infant. He disposed of two serpents sent by Hera to kill him, hopping out of the crib to do so whilst his more fragile brother screamed his head off. Zeus continued his wicked ways with Leda, this time appearing in the guise of a swan, which caused the poor girl to produce two eggs, one containing the twins Castor and Pollux, the other Clytemnestra and Helen (who later stimulated the Greek shipbuilding industry having been seduced by Paris, causing all the trouble at Troy).

And as for Mercury, son of Zeus and Maia, he left his cot and killed a turtle from which he designed the first lyre which he gave to Apollo to appease him when accused of stealing his cattle, using the intestine of one of the stolen beasts to form the strings. By comparison, the specialities of gynaecology, obstetrics and paediatrics seem a bit tame these days (fortunately).

ENGRAVING REPORT

We have recently completed some tree replacement labels for BBG and some for new plantings.

Things move very slowly in the engraving department. I follow up initial enquiries and then mostly don't hear anymore for months.



An example of this is from the Friends of the Williamstown BG who made contact more than 8 months ago, then out of the blue along came an order for tree labels. Feedback from this group has been very positive.

After some 10 months from an initial enquiry, I have just received further contact from the Friends of the Melton BG who have now secured some funding for tree labels, and are now in the position to purchase approx 100 labels. They are still in the process of identifying the trees and a firm order should be coming early in the New Year. They have samples of our work to take to their committee members.

'Misty Downs' at the Tangled Maze along with Wombat Hill Gardens at Daylesford, have also made contact, so we will wait and see if they follow up with an order. BUNINYONG GARDENS

All visitors to the Buninyong Botanic Gardens will rejoice to see the Gong now brim full with water and alive with birds and pond life. The Friends of the Buninyong Botanic Gardens could possibly be likened to the black ducks which now swim there. These birds appear to glide smoothly and calmly across the water but are actually paddling furiously beneath. After forming under the supportive umbrella of the Friends of the Ballarat Botanical Gardens, the Buninyong Friends achieved autonomy this winter, when we were officially incorporated. Since then we have been busily planning for the Garden's 150th centenary celebrations, which will culminate in October 2011.

These celebrations will encompass several functions and activities held over the year involving as many sections of the Buninyong community as possible, from kindergarten and school groups through to senior citizens. One such activity which the Ballarat Friends may find of interest is a luncheon to be held in Buninyong in May, with Mrs Tamie Fraser, head of the Australian Open Garden Scheme, as guest speaker.

Plans are underway too for a lasting structural monument to be erected in the Gardens to commemorate the 150th year, an acknowledgement of the pioneer stone wall builders of the district, a set of "dry-stone wall" entrance gates are intended for each end of the Gong, together with appropriate interpretive signage.

As well, district families will be in invited to "sponsor a tree" to be planted in the Gong area, so that current citizens have the opportunity to leave a legacy of significant trees to be enjoyed by future generations, as we enjoy the plantings of generations past.
